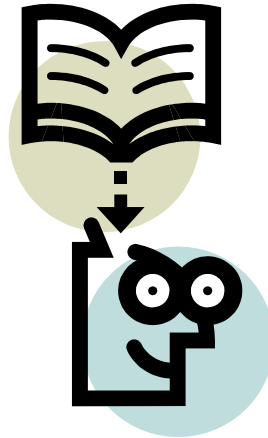


RESEARCH TIPS FOR LOWER 6

Choosing your Course – the choice of course should ideally be made before you decide where to study it, but the two decisions do go hand-in-hand

- Rural or urban environment
- Buildings and architecture
- One site/different sites – travel between the two
- Campus
- Collegiate arrangement
- Size – student numbers
- Distance from home
- Accommodation
- Reputation
- Costs
- Facilities (university or local) – specific or important to you
